
EVENING GRACE

DEACON'S MESSAGE



It seems so long ago now, but on November 21, 2023, our presiding Bishop Michael Curry conducted an online conversation on Zoom with Archbishop Hosam Naoum, the Anglican leader in the Middle East. At the time, there were an estimated 11,000 casualties in Gaza, and several hostages released that were kidnapped by the terrorist organization Hamas. We know that Israel's military action has continued these past six weeks. There are now more than an estimated 20,000 casualties in

Gaza. There are civilian causalities in Israel, as well, even though more of the hostages have been released. News from the Middle East and this ongoing war is agonizing. I have no other words for it. Caught in all of the crossfire are Palestinian children and Palestinian Christians.

Of course, the question is asked: What can we do?

When asked, the archbishop asked for prayer, above all else. That we certainly can do. I pray for peace in the Middle East and especially in the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. Most certainly, I cannot abide the terrorism of Hamas. Conversely, I cannot support the military actions and the killing of thousands of civilians by the Israeli military. This most definitely is a complex situation. I do wonder whether my prayers can change the hearts and minds of those in the seats of power who continue to negotiate for some resolution...But I <u>can</u> aid those who are striving to get people to safety and support them at this time of grief and trauma.

I think it wise to learn about—and give to—the nonprofit, <u>American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem</u> located in nearby Darien, Conn. This organization is closely monitoring the situation in Gaza and the Middle East. Their ongoing mission and ministries include financial support for schools, hospitals, and special care centers throughout Palestine, Israel, Lebanon, and Jordan. They focus on organizations that provide care for children with disabilities, many of whom come from extreme poverty. They support Ahli Arab Hospital, which was recently bombed and suffered several hundred casualties.

Frank Joseph Schnecker, a resident of Ossining for more than 50 years, passed away on Sunday, December 10, 2023. Frank was born in Manhattan on April 17, 1939 and was the son of the late Joseph and Paula (Sagl) Schnecker. He was 84.

Frank married Marian Washburn in June of 1967 in Ossining. He moved to Ossining in 1973. He was a graduate of City College with a BA in Russian. He later went on to earn his Masters in Computer Science at Pace University in Pleasantville.

Frank was a retired VP of Information Technology at the Bank of New York. Prior to that, he had a lengthy career with IBM where he oversaw network control for North America.

He was a member of Grace Church of St. Paul's on the Hill, where he was a former Treasurer. He served on several PTA boards and was a committee member for the redistricting of the Ossining School District.

Frank was a former Coach and Referee for AYSO Soccer in Ossining. He was an outstanding athlete in his own right, having played semiprofessional football and enjoyed success in basketball and bowling.

He served in the U.S. Army as an MP during the Vietnam War. He was also based out of Tripler Army Medical Center (Army Post Scofield Barracks) where he served as a translator.

Frank is survived by his loving wife Marian (Washburn); his 4 devoted children: Marian Elizabeth (Mark Filie), Frank Warren (Kirstin Reynolds), Moira (Joseph Escaravage), and Eddie (John Ramsey); and niece Kelly; His adoring 7 grandchildren; Ella, Audrey, Claire, Brigid, Cara, Maeve, and Teagan; as well as his cherished in-laws: Maureen, Jim, Donna, Heidi, and Ann.

A Final Silent Night...

ONE MORE ADVENTURE FROM CAROLYN BLACK



Remember the story a few months ago when I was just learning to drive the Austin Healey with the manual transmission and I was stuck on a hill? The bus driver and all the people on the bus were laughing hysterically when my dog jumped out of the car and I still could not get the car to move? I, of course, flooded the car and there I sat through three (3) red lights...and green ones too. Well, it finally cooperated and we did get going...and that dog (named Terry) was at the front door when my 2 year old

daughter, Dawn and I got home. Needless to say, I was furious with myself as well as the dog.

Anyway, I did get the hang of how to drive the car with the clutch and gear shifting and coordinating the two...

But three days after the bus incident, I came out of my house, arms loaded with books ready to go to class to find that the top was missing from the car! It was a British motor car and small enough for one person to lift the whole top of the car off at once. I panicked! I didn't know how I was going to get another top for the car, get to class, drop my daughter off at the sitter, and make the dog go back into the house! (My husband was in Vietnam.) Trying to figure out what to do, I had some friends at the women's college across the street (Bennett College, one of the HBCU colleges for African American women) and they kept my daughter that day. Meanwhile, I walked to the bus stop (still carrying my books) and found the change for the bus. It was only a quarter then. Lo and behold, as I got on the bus, the dog Terry jumped on behind me! I thought he was home! So I had to get off the bus, take him back to the house and wait for the next bus. I was exhausted by the time I got to class.

That same afternoon, I called my friend Jon H. who was at A & T University (another HBCU college) who was from my hometown. He came right over after I told him my top was stolen from my little Sprite. He thought it was funny, at first, but then it was predicted to rain heavily that evening. What would you do? Go to the local hardware store for a tarp. His suggestion.

I did not do that...Instead, I just cried - it had been such a lousy day. I prayed fervently that night asking God to help me through this dilemma.

Luckily, it didn't rain and the next morning the top was back on the car. It seems he went to one of the dorms and told some of the students what had happened; my husband was in Vietnam and I was raising my two year old and going to Woman's College. The students who took the top put it back on the car. I never found who did it—just a note saying "Sorry" on the windshield.

God does answer prayer...I truly believe...




OUR NEXT BOOK IS THE NOVEL THE OVERSTORY BY RICHARD POWERS!


