April is here, at last! Spring, showers, flowers, warmer weather, and hints of summer. What a blessing to be now emerging from winter and slowly entering Spring!

We are also about to enter one of the greatest blessings: the journey into Holy Week. Join us as we celebrate the climax of God's acts of love in Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday. We at Grace offer a feast of services to celebrate all the events leading to the Passion and Resurrection of our Lord, and there is something for everyone. See the Holy Week schedule on page 4 for service places and times. Come, partake, and bring family and friends. There will be Easter eggs for the kids (and the kids at heart, too).

Also note that we have a very special guest visiting us on the first Sunday after Easter, April 27<sup>th</sup>: Bishop Mary Glasspool. Bishop Mary is the Bishop Assistant in the Diocese of New York. From our diocesan website, one learns:

"The Rt. Rev. Mary D. Glasspool has been a pioneering leader in the Episcopal Church, known for her deep commitment to faith, inclusion, and social justice. Since 2016, she has served as Bishop Assistant in the Episcopal Diocese of New York, bringing wisdom, compassion, and a steadfast dedication to ministry. Previously, she made history as the first openly lesbian woman to be consecrated a bishop in the Anglican Communion, serving as Bishop Suffragan in the Diocese of Los Angeles from 2010 to 2016." When a bishop visits, it presents the opportunities for even more blessings. For example, would you like to be received as an official member of The Episcopal Church if you have never done so? It's simple! Bishop Mary would say the following prayer over you and, after that, you are a recognized member of The Episcopal Church! That's it.

"N., we recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion. God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you. Amen." (BCP, p. 310).

If you feel you have strayed from the Church and want to reaffirm your faith and journey, the Bishop will say this prayer over you:

"N., may the Holy Spirit, who has begun a good work in you, direct and uphold you in the service of Christ and his kingdom. Amen." (BCP, p. 310).

If you might want to be received or to receive the blessing of reaffirmation of your faith by Bishop Mary, email tina (tina@graceossining.org) and she will give you some more information to help you make your decision. Lori and I were received into The Episcopal Church when we decided to officially join, and it is a quick and meaningful blessing and experience. I encourage all for whom it applies to consider it.

I close this April reflection with the beginning words of the Great Vigil of Easter:

"Dear friends in Christ: On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus passed over from death to life, the Church invites her members, dispersed throughout the world, to gather in vigil and prayer. For this is the Passover of the Lord, in which, by hearing his Word and celebrating his Sacraments, we share in his victory over death."

Come share in Christ's victory over death every week, and especially in Holy Week, as we leave winter behind and celebrate the joys of our faith together.

#### EASTER PEOPLE IN A GOOD FRIDAY WORLD

My headline sums up my feelings about our Christian life together and our particular Episcopal Church take on things. I wish I could claim to be so clever as to have come up with it on my own. I actually spotted it while reading a rector's message written several years ago when we were in the heat of the COVID 19 pandemic.

We certainly knew then the challenges of suffering and loss. We were living Good Friday every day. Our current political climate has forced so many other types of losses and anxieties. Just today I met with a writer friend with whom I worked years ago. We covered education for various publications. She has just lost her job. Other teachers are being laid off. Professional researchers, aid workers, and administrators are being laid off by the thousands. All aspects of society are being challenged: rights, freedoms, education, free speech, social services, veterans' benefits, libraries, and cultural institutions.

Yet, my faith helps me to hang on to my hope. We are an Easter people. I don't know about you, but I could use a Resurrection right about now. The things that help me keep renewal alive in my life are my contemplative prayer practice, reading (of scripture and other writings), positive action, and community. You might not realize the part you play in keeping the Resurrection story real for me. But you play a key role. Every time we show up for each other I see the body of Christ at work.

We will soon be in the Easter season. We are ever called to balance our very real losses and challenges of this world with the knowledge that renewal and new life is the promise of our faith.

<u>Call to Action</u>: When the Social Action Committee met for our book discussion in mid-March, Ed led us in a discussion about creation care and environmental concerns. With Earth Day coming on April 22 and Bishop Glasspool's visit the following Sunday, several of us expressed willingness to clean up our grounds and plant some new bulbs and trees. Please let me know if you are willing to volunteer for a morning in April at our St. Paul's campus.

We also have more long-range goals for reducing use of plastic and more recycling. More to come!

## THE REV. CANON JOHN A. OSGOOD

September 5, 1948 – March 24, 2025

John Osgood, 76, of Nyack, passed away unexpectedly on Monday, March 24, 2025, at home. He is survived by his wife of 39 years, Maribeth; his three step-daughters: Jennifer, Lauren, and Allison; three grandchildren: Kaitlyn, Andrew, and Penelope; his sister Jayne, her late partner Carla, and their son Tristam; two sons-in-law: Douglas and Anthony, as well as a sister-in-law, brother-in-law, six nephews, and one niece. John was predeceased by his parents, Norma and Albert, his sister, brother, two nephews, and a niece.



John accomplished much in his 76 years. He graduated from Nyack High School and Union College and earned a Master's in Theology from the University of Birmingham. He was ordained a Deacon at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine and a Priest at Christ Church in Suffern.

John served as the curate at Christ Church, Suffern, Chaplain at Rockland Community College, and Rector at Christ the King, Stone Ridge. He went on to become the Chair of the Anglican-Roman Catholic Committee, a tutor at General Theological Seminary, Rector at Grace Church, Middletown, and a member of the EDNY Standing Committee. John also established a soup kitchen at Grace Church, which became a model for other clergy and churches in how to serve and minister to the hungry.

John concluded his career by serving as Canon to the Ordinary for three Bishops at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine before retiring in 2014.

Above all, John was a deeply prayerful priest, known for his reverent and calming presence. He brought humor and love into every endeavor. Throughout his 50-year pastoral career, John was a trusted confidant to many priests who sought his counsel and encouragement. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

A service will be held at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine on Wednesday, April 9, 2025, at 5:00 PM. John's ashes will be interred in the columbarium at the Cathedral.





#### ANTI-RACISM IN-PERSON WORKSHOP

This in-person workshop will take place on two consecutive Saturdays (May 3 and May 10) from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM
At Trinity St. Paul's Church, New Rochelle, 311 Huguenot Street

The diocesan Antiracism Workshop is a key initiative of the Antiracism Committee. The workshop's purpose is to help us become aware of how the sin of racism impacts ALL our lives, and how we all unconsciously and consciously participate in racist systems. We generally conduct three workshops a year in the fall, winter, and spring. All workshops require pre-work which includes viewing videos and completing online exercises. Dialogue is the foundation of the two-day in-person workshop. We use group exercises and examine scientific and historical evidence (video format) concerning the origins of the concept of race and its legacy. There is no cost to register and attend for members of our diocese. At our in-person workshop, continental breakfast and lunch are provided. Of the hundreds of workshop participants, 98% have found the workshop to be at least "moderately useful" with a great majority indicating it would be "very useful" or "extremely useful" in their work and daily lives.

Approximately four weeks before the date of the first workshop session you will get an email with the subject: Time Sensitive Information regarding the EDNY Anti-Racism Workshop. This email will ask you to confirm attendance and will provide logistical information on the location and the pre-work to be completed before the workshop. We ask everyone to reconfirm within a week of receiving the email so that we can open slots to anyone on the waiting list.
