# AN UNOFFICIAL LETTER FROM BISHOP ASSISTANT MARY GLASSPOOL

The Collect for this coming Sunday is about trust: Grant us, O Lord, to trust in you with all our hearts; for, as you always resist the proud who confide in their own strength, so you never forsake those who boast in your mercy. Amen.

I find the concept of trust to be an exceedingly difficult one. The Oxford Dictionary definition of trust (as a noun) is "firm belief in the reliability, truth, ability, or strength of someone or something." And then it gives as an example: Relations have to be built on trust.

Trust seems hard to come by these days. Too often people whom we had thought were reliable behave in an unreliable way, and then, we say, they have betrayed our trust. This set up is a fragile one. Common expression of how this works is that it takes quite a while to build trust between two people. In contrast, trust can be completely broken in a relatively brief amount of time—and then it takes a lifetime to restore—if that is even possible.

There's a wonderful article on How to Build Trust in the Workplace by Maggie Wooll. In addition to basic definitions, Wooll offers the following ten ways in which to build trust: 1. Value long-term relationships. 2. Be honest. 3. Honor your commitments. 4. Admit when you're wrong. 5. Communicate effectively. 6. Be vulnerable. 7. Be helpful. 8. Show people that you care. 9. Stand up for what's right. 10. Be transparent. She elaborates on each of these ways (i.e. Communicate effectively includes listening as well as speaking) and concludes with "Building trust doesn't happen overnight."

Much of what I have learned about trust has come experientially and perhaps no more intensely than in the Hurricane Island Outward Bound course I participated in during the summer of 1975. Outward Bound is a kind of survival/wilderness experience that is meant to help individuals as members of a group or team to develop skills in self-reliance and trust. One exercise we had to do (which some people actually thought was fun) was to belay down 60 feet of sheer rock cliff over the pounding surf of the ocean-Otter Cliffs (yup - that's it in the picture)-and then, even worse, we had to climb those cliffs all the way back to the top. The one thing you're supposed to remember when you rock climb is to do it with your fingers and toes and body stretched out away from the rock. Rappelling down was fine (I couldn't see how high up I was). Climbing back up, the first 20 feet I did all right...but then I looked down and I froze. I clung to the rock. I couldn't even feel my fingers and toes, much less move them to climb. I was stuck there for what seemed like hours, with other members of the team all trying to tell me what to do. I couldn't even hear what they were saying. Then I finally heard one voice out of the cacophony. Mary! she said calmly. It was my favorite instructor. Do not be afraid. Listen to me and I will talk with you while you continue to climb. Just don't look down. Trust me. As far as I was concerned, it was the voice of God. I did as she said and was soon safe at the top of the cliffs.

Barbara Smith, black feminist author and advocate, wrote "Trust is to human relationships what faith is to gospel living. It is the beginning place, the foundation upon which more can be built. Where trust is, love can flourish." As we move into a challenging and exciting fall season, I pray that we will trust in God with all our hearts, and from that foundation continue to build relationships of trust with one another, so that where trust is, love can flourish.



- 1. Spiritually preparing to make a visit;
- 2. The materials that you will need for a visit;
- 3. What to do once you arrive;
- 4. The worship/liturgical content of a visit;
- 5. Writing up a visit for clergy or warden; and
- 6. What to "do" or not do after a visit.

There is no charge for this online training.



# SUMMARY OF THE BOOK CLUB'S AUGUST DISCUSSION



Pachinko by Min Jin Lee was a compelling and complex story of a Korean's family (4 generations) history over 80 years (from 1910-1989). The author was so gifted in capturing the perspective of an adolescent finding her way in life, living with the lifelong consequences of her actions and doing her best for her family to ensure that future generations would survive and do better in the world. This book used some universal themes which touched on gender, shame, honoring deceased

ancestors, being marginalized based on one's cultural origins and economic status, plus the gifts/"superpowers" which come with, education, being fluent in other languages, and having personal knowledge of other cultures in the world.

IMHO, *Pachinko* on Apple TV had a cast of actors who were chosen for their good looks. Any physical scars/deformities were not noticeable, and sections of the book were either skipped or replaced by new episodes which were not part of the book. However, the production did honor the migrant story as they recorded dialogues using both Japanese and Korean as the characters would in the book.
