Be sure to read the other reports for more details of what's going on at Grace. It's going to be a GREAT year together!

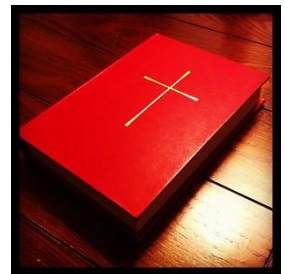

## DEACON BEACON

Have you wondered lately why I've been wearing the beautiful orange stole exclusively? It was a gift from Bill Cruse. But though I cherish it for that reason alone, there's a deeper meaning. Why orange?

On January 21, 2013, 15-year-old Hadiya Pendleton marched in President Obama's second inaugural parade. One week later, Hadiya was shot and killed on a playground in Chicago. Soon after this tragedy, Hadiya's friends commemorated her life by wearing orange, the color hunters wear in the woods to protect themselves and others. Wear Orange is now observed every June. Thousands of people wear the color orange to honor Hadiya and the more than 43,000 Americans that are killed with guns and approximately 76,000 more that are shot and wounded every year.



I have worked in prison ministry since before I was ordained in 2006. Gun violence and the death penalty are offshoots of this passion for me, and I believe these three things are closely tied together. Last June when I put my orange stole on, I thought, "what if I wear this orange stole every Sunday until we have sensible gun laws in our country?" And that's how it began.

Besides the stole being a gift from Bill, and all it stands for regarding gun violence, I love the children represented on it. I believe we must all be outraged by gun violence and work to end the murder of innocent people by guns, and especially we must remember the children who never had the chance to grow up as the result of gun violence.

Yesterday in Jacksonville, Florida, a white man shot and killed three black people before killing himself. This gunman was held by the authorities in 2017 for a psychiatric evaluation. He was released. He bought the guns he used in this weekend's shooting this year, legally. Our laws are very broken. Until our lawmakers make the changes we demand, this kind of senseless murder will not end. Say what you want about our mental health issues in North America, but this person should not have had the ability to legally purchase assault weapons or any gun for that matter.

We can, and I believe we must, make our outrage known. Besides the mental health issue in the recent murder, it was a racially motivated attack. OUTRAGEOUS.

There is so much to do to make the dream of these United States come true. The children being raised today are the future of our country, we must model a different way for them so they can make better choices for all of us. And for that to happen, they must stay alive. It's our responsibility to protect them and ourselves, not with guns but with sensible laws.

I am wearing orange in honor of all who have died needlessly. And to let the outrage I feel carry me forward to action.

- Did someone say "wreaths"? Yikes!

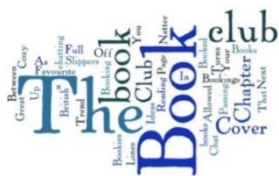

## COACH HENRY BLACK'S ENSHRINEMENT INTO THE E. E. SMITH SPORTS HALL OF FAME

From Carolyn Black:

The weekend of Memorial Day was extremely busy and important to members of my family. My oldest daughter, Dawn Lynette, traveled to Fayetteville, NC. to represent the Black family as her grandfather, Henry Andrew Black, Sr., was inducted into the E.E. Smith Athletic Hall of Fame. All the accomplishments of my dad were done under Jim Crow laws. I also grew up under those laws and so did my husband and brother. Many folks today think the laws are not enacted or enforced today, but racism is still with us in many forms. Dawn made a wonderful speech and met many of the men whose lives my father touched. She was so proud of his



accomplishments especially since she learned of them very recently. He will be inducted into two other Halls of Fame in 2024. And here is Dawn's speech:

On behalf of my grandfather Coach Henry Black's family, I express sincere appreciation to the E. E. Smith Sports Hall of Fame for his enshrinement into the Hall, along with the other distinguished members of the Class of 2023. And congratulate those athletes, members of my grandfather's 1937, '38 and '39 state championship teams, and their families.

Coach H.A. Black, or Granddad as I called him, was born in Tarboro, NC. He was a 1929 graduate of Shaw University where he is one of the few to letter in four sports: baseball, track, football, and basketball. He was captain of the 1927 Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) championship basketball team, inducted into the Shaw Hall of Fame in 1981, and the CIAA Hall of Fame in 1982.

My granddad coached football and women and men's basketball at E. E. Smith from 1929 to 1940. His men's basketball team won 46 straight games from 1937 to 1939; 3 state championships; 3 tri-regional championships and competed for the nation high school championship in 1939. The late, great Coach D. T. Carter, a member of E. E. Smith's Inaugural Hall of Fame Class of 2022, was captain of that team. Granddad then coached basketball and football at Fayetteville State University, where his basketball and football teams won back-to-back conference championships in 1940 and 1941.

In 1943, he became one of the first Black postal clerks in Fayetteville. For 15 years, he served as local president of the National Alliance of Postal and Federal Employees, a union established in 1913 to safeguard and improve the employment of Black postal



employees. He retired from the Post Office in 1972. My granddad was a proud Q, having organized the Beta Chi Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and served as its Basileus for two years. In 1977 he was chosen as its Man of the Year. Granddad was a trustee of Evans Metropolitan A.M.E. Zion Church and was selected as its Man of the Year in 1981. He was an active member of the Black Free Masons, and President of the Fayetteville Chapter of the Shaw University Alumni Association and, organized the Negro College Fund Chapter in Fayetteville.

My granddad was married to Madeline Black, who taught 8th grade math at Washington Drive Jr. High School, for 43 years. They had two children, my mother, Carolyn Black Hightower, Smith Class of 1963, and my late uncle, Henry Black, Smith Class of 1964. I am one of his grandchildren, along with my sister Jenelle and brother Todd Berrien, Kyle, and Brandon Black. His great grandchildren include Jordan and Julianna Piscitelli, Avery, Oliver, and Kate Black.

It is indeed an esteemed honor to the family of Coach Henry Black for the E. E. Smith Sports Hall of Fame Committee chose him to join its 2023 Hall of Fame Class to be enshrined into its Hall. We thank you, and the entire Smith Alumni Family, 1,800 Strong, for this wonderful testament to our father and grandfather's greatness. And a personal thank you to Oliver Melvin for all assistance he has provided including this speech!

EfM is a four-year Christian Formation program founded and administered through the School of Theology of the University of the South at Sewanee. Through study, prayer, worship, and reflection, EfM seminar groups journey together through scripture, church history, and theology.

A seminar group consists of one or two mentors and up to twelve participants. The group meets up to 36 times during the course of a year. Years 1 & 2 study the Hebrew Scriptures, the Gospels, and the New Testament. Year 3 looks at Church History. Year 4 reads systematic theology, developing and enhancing their own practice.

During a weekly online seminar, the group builds an intentional faith-seeking small group by doing these things:

- Check-in: How has the group encountered and responded to God since the last seminar?
- Worship: Participants lead worship
- Reflect theologically (TR): After agreeing upon a shared focus, the group examines tradition and culture, paired with experiences and beliefs, concluding with implications for action.
- Study coursework: Participants discuss insights, challenges, "aha" moments of assigned readings.
- Hospitality: The group spends time in fellowship.

I mentor this group with Lanning Taliaferro. We meet from 7:00–8:30 PM on Thursdays from September to June. Email me if you're interested, for more information.
