I want to start by thanking everyone for the successful implementation of our Fall Mid-Year Report to the Parish last Sunday. If you missed it, there is a summary of the meeting on page 6. I've heard from many people after the meeting face-to-face, over the phone, by text, and by email, and if I were to summarize the general response, it would be: "Most of us have been aware of these issues since before the merger, Hal, and it is important to get updates on where we are now and to proceed with this together in a positive, faithful



manner that is solution-focused and will ensure Grace's success." I couldn't agree more. Thanks again to all who helped make this hard but important meeting a successful start.

Some of the local Jewish, Muslim, Christian, and secular leaders that I have been meeting with for over a year will participate in a Community Silent Vigil this Sunday, October 6th, at 3:00 PM at Market Square in Ossining. Prayers will also be read from the different traditions, and I will be reading the prayer below from our *Book of Common Prayer*. This vigil is free and open to all, so come and invite friends. We are praying for peace and justice for all and an end to the bloodshed and a return to non-violent diplomacy.

Finally, on a happier note, we have the Blessing of the Animals this Sunday at Trinity. Come and bring your animals. They are very welcome to be with us in the sanctuary during our 10:30 AM worship service and we shall bless then in the courtyard afterwards or Potter Hall if there is rain.

Here's a prayer I've been saying a lot of late from our Prayer Book for our national and international needs (BCP, page 823). I invite you to do likewise in the days and weeks ahead:

Grant, O God, that your holy and life-giving Spirit may so move every human heart that barriers which divide us may crumble, suspicions disappear, and hatreds cease; that our divisions being healed, we may live in justice and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

DEACON'S CORNER

NAVIGATING THE CROSSROADS OF RELIGION AND POLITICS

The year was 2000 and we were facing what we then thought was the most contentious, divisive presidential election of our lifetime. It was George W. Bush versus Al Gore. At the time I was an acolyte and choir member at the other Grace Episcopal Church, the one in White Plains. This was the place where I came back to an active faith life and was so warmly embraced by a diverse, dedicated, and loving community. That Grace so often reminds me of our Grace in Ossining. You have a lot in common.

It was the Sunday before Tuesday's elections, and our rector, Mother Janet, gave a sermon that has always stayed with me. I am quoting from memory. She reviewed the passage of Luke, Chapter 4, where Jesus is in the synagogue and reads from the scroll of Isaiah.

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

Isaiah affirms that he cares for the poor and the oppressed and is telling us that the messiah to come will care for the poor and the oppressed. Then Jesus sits to teach the people and tells them that this prophecy—this reading—is fulfilled upon their hearing him. In other words, I am the one to fulfill this prophecy and I, have come for the poor and the oppressed.

They did not like this. They ran him out.

Mother Janet continued to note that it is not an easy go to continually stand for the poor and the oppressed.

As clergy it would be completely inappropriate for me to declare who you should vote for. It would be completely wrong to claim that you would be a good Christian if you voted for one candidate instead of the other.

What I can ask you is this: Who do you think shares Isaiah's and Jesus's care for the poor and the oppressed? Who do you think will help the poor and the oppressed?"

That is all I can ask of you. Voting is one crucial way for us to work toward making ours a more perfect union. Choosing the candidate that aligns with our social gospel is an important act.

We all know that there are many who feel otherwise. It isn't a secret ballot in some churches. People are told who to vote for. They are shamed and harassed if they do not agree with their pastor or congregation on candidates or issues. This is spiritual abuse, and also flies in the face of nonprofit status, and so many other norms.

We are seeing the increasing rise of Christian nationalism—the belief that America is ordained to be only a Chrisitan nation that would largely favor the white race. Men would certainly be in authority. There are forces at work to abolish the separation of church and state. They are sometimes fierce, threatening, and destructive. This is when I say my prayers and ask God to guide my words and my actions. I may be scared, but I will not be silent. I will be gracious and I will work for peace. But I will not abandon Isaiah and Jesus.

GRACE EPISCOPAL CHURCH SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT TO THE PARISH SEPTEMBER 29, 2024

Grace Semi-Annual Parish Meeting

Below is a brief summary of our 2024 Mid-Year Report to the Parish which occurred Sunday, September 29th at Grace's St. Paul's campus after the 10:30 AM worship service. It was an important and challenging meeting. It is no surprise to any of us who were part of the original merger of St. Paul's and Trinity into Grace that there was a budget deficit that preceded the merger and that has also continued after the merger. Both sites are large, beautiful, expensive to maintain, and are financially valuable properties. Managing both continues to put a significant strain on Grace financially, in addition to our parish volunteers who struggle to generously volunteer their time and talents for Grace. The goal of this semi-annual parish meeting was to transparently share the details of this financial information, review and discuss it, so we all know, together, in real time, where we at Grace stand.

As of September 2024, after a year and a half of Fr. Hal's focused work and partnership with Grace's leadership, we now know for certain that we cannot eliminate the budget deficit through the standard traditional pledge drives, stewardship campaigns, membership growth targets, budgetary "belt tightening," special appeals, and other old customary measures.

The \$210,110 budget deficit is too large, the number of our 35 pledgers is too small, Grace cannot grow the number of pledgers fast enough to offset the deficit, and the donations required on an individual basis to balance the budget exceeds the financial capacity of most of our members. We must therefore continue to fill the gap by borrowing over a hundred thousand dollars a year from our endowment. Please note, our total financial portfolio today is \$2,861,774, based on the combined total of our endowment/investments. While those withdrawals will not drain the endowment for approximately ten years, we will eventually deplete it, and that is a reality none of us are willing to accept because it effectively destroys the long-term viability of Grace as a vibrant parish and perpetual source for good works in Ossining.

Thus, we must eventually make some hard choices about what to do with our expensive and valuable two campuses. Fr. Hal shared that the vestry's feeling on this matter, decided at its August meeting, is that we are not ready to make any momentous decisions at this time. Fr. Hal agreed. The vestry believes we need to gather more information and hard data about our options, the costs of maintaining both campuses, the financial value of both campuses, and more, before we can, as one Grace community, discern together those important facts and make our decisions.

All of our speakers sought to share this information in a way that was clear, honest, and urgent, but without panic. Why no panic? Because when Grace either sells, rents, or some combination thereof regarding one or both of its campuses, it should be able to leverage the resulting net financial gains into an already large financial endowment which thereby secures its future in Ossining. As Fr. Hal; Darryl, and Cecilia, our wardens; Beth, our treasurer; Richard, our investment chair; and other speakers consistently repeated, while this is hard information to hear, it is not bleak. Indeed, our future is very bright, if not assured, if we responsibly update our strategy, do not deplete the endowment, and do not continue overextending ourselves to maintain two campuses that risks burning out our people and exhausts our limited savings. The vestry will gather more detailed information on the deferred maintenance at both campuses, the costs, the campus property values, Grace's options, and more, so we will have that information for the parish in five months at our February 2025 Annual Meeting. Until then feel free to contact me, your wardens, and/or members of the Vestry with any concerns or suggestions you may have on this matter. I value and appreciate the trust and faith that you all have shown me during my year and a half here during this critical time in Grace's history.

ST. PAUL'S CAMPUS PARISH HALL REVITALIZATION TASK TEAM

A team consisting of Amy Kitahata-Sporn, Jo McGrath, and Lisa Rosenbloom met on June 6th, charged by the vestry with the task of evaluating the St. Paul's Campus Parish Hall in order to create a simple, uncluttered room allowing for the Parish Hall and immediate surroundings to be attractive to a broad range of people. The meeting resulted in several recommendations including but not limited to: removing EVERYTHING from the walls, cleaning the overhead exhaust fan vents, investigating presentation/projection set up with a goal of providing easy access for future rentals, cleaning the surfaces of both sideboard cabinets, bench, and louvered screens, donating the hutch, and extending any painting/brightening of surfaces to the kitchen including flooring.

The results of the committee's recommendations are obvious as you enter all the spaces in the Parish Hall, kitchen, and ancillary rooms in the adjacent hallway.

Many of the recommendations were easily accomplished with volunteer labor, some were more difficult and required financial expenditures and some were tabled for a later date. These pictures show what has been accomplished to date.

Many thanks to Amy Kitahata-Sporn and Beth Pollack for giving so generously of their time and talents to get these tasks done. Thank you also to Manuel Contracting (Manny and his son Edwin) for their work in the July and August heat to meticulously lay the flooring and troubleshoot some unexpected complications. Thank you to St. Paul's late member Joan Hampshire for her generous donation which allowed for the new and improved flooring.









LOAVES AND FISH

This year Election Day falls on **Tuesday, November 5, 2024**. We will be voting for the 47th President of the United States, as well as for United States Senator, Representative for the 17th Congressional District, and a variety of state, county, and local offices. On Election Day, the polls are open from 6:00 AM to 9:00 PM. As per the New York State Board of Elections, early voting will also be available from October 26, 2024 - November 3, 2024. In order to vote, you must be a registered voter. <u>https://voterlookup.elections.ny.gov/</u> is a voter database maintained by the NYS Board of Elections. It can help you determine your polling location, voter district information, and whether or not your voter status is "Active". If it is not "Active," you need to contact the Westchester County Board of Elections at **(914) 995-5700**.

If you are not already registered, you MUST submit a completed, signed, and dated Voter Registration Form that is received no later than **October 26th**. The form can be found online at <u>https://citizenparticipation.westchestergov.com/register-to-vote</u>. If you are unable to print the form or have difficulty completing the form, Ed Shultz will be available Sunday, September 22nd between noon-2:00 PM to assist with completing the form. In addition, you can contact the Westchester County Board of Elections by phone or visit in person during normal business hours. The Westchester Board of Elections is located at:





THE SWEETNESS OF WATER by Nathan Harris is an unforgettable debut novel about trauma and survival during the early Reconstruction period in the American South. NPR's review had this packed sentiment about the timelessness of this story:



BUILDING SAFETY TEAM

Grace's Building Safety Team (Ann Barringer-Spaeth, Kelly Ishmael, Milton Kerr, Amy Kitahata-Sporn, Kate Pendzuk, and Steve Pendzuk) has been busy! They have identified six areas to target, as noted in the September issue of *Grace Notes*.



- Kate and Steve Pendzuk met with three alarm/security companies to do campus walkthroughs in order to make recommendations for safety and security in the form of proposals to equip our properties with their systems.
- Amy also participated in the Episcopal Parish Network's Mini-Summit on Church/School Security and Safety. The summit covered multiple areas to be addressed as well as how to go about putting together a comprehensive plan. A link is available if anyone would like to review that presentation.

The walkthrough with the two inspectors from FCS made the team aware of many safety, ADA, and security issues and outlined three levels of safety:

- 1) Minimum requirements required by code (including those things that have been grandfathered in as long as no new renovations are made)
- 2) Retroactive requirements (to bring our buildings up to current safety requirements)
- 3) Enhanced life-safety measures/recommendations


It is recommended that we look beyond the minimum requirements which have allowed our campuses to operate without code violation to implementing current safety standards/requirements for all our facilities.

The BST decided to put an inspection by FCS Consultants on hold, since we are hoping the free estimates from the three alarm/security companies in conjunction with Kate & Steve's experience would make paying for FCS Consultants redundant. Kate will be providing copies of the three proposals and a report explaining the proposals. This concludes the work of the team to date.

The next stage will be to put together new teams to:

- Review the three alarm/security company proposals and report and make a recommendation to the vestry.
- Identify safety and security priorities and "low-hanging fruit" (projects that can be easily implemented). This could include self-closing/locking doors, lighting, security systems with apps for access, ADA compliance, signage, removing bolts from access doors, and clearing exits of any excess furniture.
- Research and write: (A) safety procedures and drills; (B) training for life saving situations; C) research and writing of grants for funding.
