Happy October, Beloved.

It's time to "tell out your soul"! Are you ready and willing?

Okay, so here's a pop quiz for you: do you recognize that phrase? Can you even name what hymn it's from? Can you name the century? Is it the twentieth? Nineteenth? Eighteenth century? I'll give you bonus points if you can name the hymn creator and the source for the hymn. Do you know? Do you have a guess? (I admit that I recognized the phrase but couldn't name the hymn or the century or anything else. D- grade for me! HaHa. How about you?)

It's from the hymn by the same name, *Tell Out, My Soul*, written by Timothy Dudley-Smith in 1962 and is based on the Magnificat, or Song of Mary, in Luke 1:46-55. It is a hymn of praise and is Number 437 in our Hymnal 1982:

Tell out, my soul, the greatness of the Lord! Unnumbered blessings give my spirit voice; Tender to me the promise of his word; In God my Savior shall my heart rejoice.

This is the spirit behind our Grace New Futures discernment efforts: we gather to tell out the unnumbered blessings we each have experienced through the years at St. Paul's, Trinity, and the merged Grace. What are the blessings you have received by being at Grace no matter how long you have been here? There's more information on this on pages 5 and 6.


God is with us and has been guiding us, and God has a powerful future for us individually and collectively as Grace. It is vital we discern that together. This Sunday, we have our next Grace New Futures event in Trinity's Potter Parish Hall after worship from noon to 3:00 PM. Come! You are an important part of this process of discernment! Even if you missed the first event, it doesn't matter because each event topic is separate from the next. Lunch — lasagna, ziti, salad, and other scrumptious goodies — shall be provided thanks to our Hospitality Committee.

The topic for Sunday's meeting is telling out God's work in Grace's history. Where has God been active in the history of St. Paul's, Trinity, and Grace? We have each had concrete experiences of God's unnumbered blessings in our personal and communal lives at Grace and it is vital to recognize that history of God working in our history and midst so we can hear the call of God in our present time. Come and participate. It's fun and no experience or knowledge is required. You will be taught how to do everything asked of you.

Tell Out My Soul is also the theme of this year's 2026 Stewardship Campaign. It fits perfectly with our Grace New Futures activity. Also, the stewardship materials are provided free of charge courtesy of our diocese and you will be seeing thoughtful reflections during our 2026 stewardship campaign. Be sure to check them out and reflect on the questions they ask.

The reflections all revolve around the same theme: what unnumbered blessings have you experienced that give your spirit voice? What unnumbered blessings has Grace been for others in the community that give their spirit voice? Stewardship is not about keeping the lights on; it's about using our time, talents, and treasure to deepen our



relationship with God, one another, and the local community, especially those in need. Mark your calendar: Pledge Sunday is November 9, 2025 at Grace's St. Paul's campus. You will be getting more information in the mail about our 2025 Stewardship drive soon.

DEACON'S MESSAGE

"We can make a difference."



In mid-August, many gathered at St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church, White Plains for a prayer vigil for Ketty Elizabeth De Los Santos, an asylum seeker from Peru who has been detained by ICE and believed to be held in a facility in Louisiana. At the vigil, Bishop Allen Shin promised that the diocese would support with the legal expenses. Some of us asked Bishop Allen that day how we can help.

In quick fashion, the diocese established the Sanctuary Legal Fund to support immigrant families in our congregations and neighborhoods throughout the Diocese of New York. The Legal Fund will help those navigating immigration under urgent and vulnerable circumstances to access legal resources. It will work through partnerships with local nonprofit immigration legal providers and can underwrite limited financial assistance for emergency legal support. The Fund cannot cover ongoing individual representation, except in rare urgent circumstances when no *pro bono* option is available.

The Fund reflects our Diocese's commitment to safety, pastoral care, and justice. We are a sanctuary diocese. As Christian community we provide safe places of belonging. Our congregations welcome everyone, every day, without regard to their immigration status. Increasingly, providing safety means offering support for our congregations and neighbors to know their rights through often confusing process.

We need your help to launch. We start with a \$50,000 contribution from bishop's discretionary funds. Help us to match this amount to keep families together. With your support, we can do more so that no one faces the system alone. Your contribution makes possible same-day response, family preparedness, limited-scope appearances, and urgent filings. STEPHEN W. BELCHER NOVEMBER 20, 1993—SEPTEMBER 19, 2025



Stephen W. Belcher, a 9-year resident of Plattsburgh, New York, and a former 13-year resident of Bedford Hills, passed away unexpectedly on September 19, 2025, in Plattsburgh, New York. He was born on November 20,1993 to Jan M. Barrows and William H. Belcher in Sleepy Hollow, New York (Phelps Hospital). He was the grandson of Betty Barrows, a long-time parishioner of our Trinity campus.

He graduated from Fox Lane High School in 2012 and graduated Summa Cum Laude with a double major in English and Philosophy at SUNY Plattsburgh, Plattsburgh, New York, in May 2021.

Stephen was an Associate for Cooperative Development Institute's (CDI) Water Infrastructure Support Program, where he helped raise and manage federal funds for infrastructure upgrades at mobile home parks across New England. His boss and close friend, Jeremiah, said, "He was a rock star at the job. He really made a huge

impact on people's lives - he kept their housing affordable and ensured they had safe water to drink. He was able to deal with the technical red tape and explain how everything works to those who lived in the homes."

Stephen was a very kind and gentle young man, who found peace and joy in nature. He was intelligent, thoughtful, and empathetic—anyone who knew him loved him. He cherished hiking in Upstate New York at Pointe Au Roche, walking and biking outdoors and sharing his love of cooking with his Mom. He was also an amazing baker and could even make macarons. He found connection in playing video games online with his brother Robert and held close the memories of a special family trip to Europe, especially the time spent in Sweden. Above all, Stephen showed a deep love and care for those closest to him. A devoted son, brother, nephew, cousin, and friend, his presence touched countless lives. He also found immeasurable joy and love with his cats, Plato and Misty.

He is survived by his mother, Jan Barrows; his brother, Robert Belcher; his aunt, Judy Barrows; his cousin, Karley Ryan; and his father, William Belcher. He is also survived by many friends and other relatives.

When I am saddened, I tighten my grip and gladness glides along its quivering path; When the waste places of my spirit appear in arid confusion, the thread becomes a channel of newness of life.

One thread is a strange thread – it is my steadying thread. God's hand holds the other end.

GRACE GRIEF GROUP






