This Sunday is also Pledge Sunday, where we give thanks to God for our life and its goodness, including the promises of God and Christ to bring us — by the mercy, power, and loving will of God — to join our Saints one day in Paradise. We also thank God that now, through the Holy Spirit, God also promises to help us live ever greater lives of compassion, empowerment, and engagement with others not only for our health and well-being but also for the health and well-being of all. Thanks be to God! Join us for worship and for the food feast and fellowship afterwards. It is good and important to be together and to support each other in these trying times. Indeed, it is "meet and right so to do"! Come join in. It will be nourishing for us all on so many important levels.

Our Grace New Future Mission Discernment is going well. Lately, we have been looking at current data about Ossining and its environs. If you haven't seen this fascinating information, email Tina at tina@graceossining.org and and she will email it back to you as an attachment. You can also call her at the Grace office at (914) 941-6627.

Additionally, last Sunday, many of us were trained to do interviews with strangers and to take photos of change, growth, and opportunity in Ossining. We have three weeks now to conduct interviews, to take photos, and to send them to graceossining@gmail.com. Whether or not you are able to participate in the interviews or photos, come to the "debrief" session on Sunday, November 23rd from noon to 2:00 PM at our St. Paul's campus to learn together what people discovered. Lunch will be provided. A significant number of people in the Grace New Futures program also want to explore in greater detail the origin story of St. Paul's and Trinity from the 19th century and come to a deeper and more complete understanding of that history. There is also a desire to explore how those dynamics are impacting us personally today as a parish community. To make all this happen well, we are exploring some local, facilitated engagement models, like restorative justice work, so we can have experts lead us in constructive and healing dialogue around these important issues. We are still in the research phase of finding the right program and

facilitators, but we will get back to you when we know more. Given the busy-ness of November and December, these important conversations will likely begin in January when our community life slows down a bit. We'll keep you updated, though, as we learn more.

Continue to pray for Grace. We are doing courageous and faithful work: exploring our origins and the impact in the present; looking at data about Ossining today that both affirms and challenges our assumptions; interviewing people in town to learn more about what they like best and least about Ossining and where their "spiritual home" is (Note: "nature" and "the river" are the most popular responses so far to that last question for the four of us that have already done some initial interviews. Fascinating!). And there is a lot more to this discernment process to come over the next six months. Remember that we are doing all these activities to discern over time a clear sense of God's call for Grace that answers the question, "What does God want Grace to do and be about *now*?" It's a roller-coaster of an adventure. Don't miss out on being a part!

Here's a prayer written by a member of the Prayer Choir. One of the subgroups of the Grace New Futures team, the prayer choir is comprised of Grace people constantly praying for and crafting prayers for Grace that speak to us in the present moment.

God, we know that with you, we are learning who we are and who we are called to be. Give us courageous hearts and minds to be searching and fearless as we discern your will. God, your immeasurable love and the hope of Jesus will heal this hurting world. Help us to be a place where the story of Jesus' saving grace is pronounced for all who are seeking hope. In his name, we pray. Amen.

Enjoy reading the rest of this November newsletter. You'll see there is a GO! (Grace Outing!) event coming at Bethany Arts Center this month...and much more. Know that in this month of Thanksgiving, I give thanks to God for each of you and for the huge, collective difference we make together. We are a fun, compassionate group and we make a difference in each other's lives and the lives of many in Ossining, and beyond. And we aren't done yet! Thank you for all you are and all you do; you are indeed a blessing to many.

DEACON'S MESSAGE

WE REMEMBER

These are challenging and perilous times for the transgender community. There is a level of derision, hate speech, and misunderstanding that I thought we had moved beyond. Wishful thinking on my part. Since January, the members of our transgender community have been targeted. We are, once again, living with a ban on serving in the military. Some have been denied their retirement benefits. Many young people who identify as transgender are being denied healthcare. We are seeing a record number of anti-trans laws being passed in many states.

I shared earlier this year that I have a strong connection to the transgender community. When I first joined The LOFT Community Center in White Plains in the late 1990s, I started to really understand gender expression. Annie and I have friends from every part of the LGBTQ+ community. The first Transgender Day of Remembrance happened in 1999, and it was intended to provide a funeral service for members of the community who had died, especially those who died from hate crimes and acts of violence. Annie, my spouse, and I have attended many TDOR services and we have helped organize several.

I shared earlier this year that the young adult whom I have always known as my niece has transitioned and come out to the family. My niece is now my nephew Leon. While we are completely supportive of Leon, we can't help being concerned. I was very relieved when Leon moved from Texas to Seattle, Washington, found a new job, and seems to have found a supportive new group of friends. I was thrilled that Leon reached out to family and let us reconnect and be part of his life.

So why do we need a Transgender Day of Remembrance?

Transgender Day of Remembrance seeks to highlight the losses we face due to anti-transgender bigotry and violence. It makes a space for grief and to remember those we've lost, especially those who may have no one else to pray for them. TDOR is observed globally with vigils, marches, and other events. It has expanded to include a call to action, shedding light on the ongoing struggle for transgender rights and safety.

TDOR is officially held on November 20. This year, a group of us is doing an Evensong service on Sunday, November 9, at 4:00 PM., at Christ Church/San Marcos Tarrytown. Please join us.

Vestry Year-End Tasks Include:

- * <u>2026 Budget</u> Our Annual Budget is a work in progress which will be approved before our 2026 Annual Meeting.
- * <u>Lease Agreements</u> We have updated the language in our tenant's lease to reflect: 1) Should The Diocese of New York mandate any special training or new policies, we may need to amend the terms of our current lease with them; and 2) we have officially notified them of our current New Futures Discernment Process and we will advise them of any outcomes which may impact the future availability of our space and/or property. We will be able honor the timeline of their current lease with Grace Episcopal Church.
- * <u>By-Laws</u> We will be reviewing Grace's By-Laws, Article 2, Section 2 to determine if the number, qualifications and terms of the organized body of our leadership needs to be amended. - * The 249th Annual Diocesan Convention will be held on Saturday, November 15th at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, 147 Amsterdam Avenue, New York City. Our delegates are Beth Pollack, Cecilia Quintero, Fr. Hal, and Deacon Jean Marie.

As we look forward to continuing making progress in 2025 and beyond, Grace needs to be open, honest, direct, and focused in our work together to meet the challenges which lie ahead. And we need everyone to continue to be engaged and active participants in this great and dynamic experiment of our merged church.




