TOGETHER CELEBRATING CHRIST & ADVENT – YUMMY!



Ahhhh, Advent!

This Sunday, we celebrate the beginning of a new liturgical year and a new liturgical season, Advent. I *love* the season of Advent! I love all the special Advent colors and symbols, the traditions, and the culmination of the season in the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas. It's an especially rich liturgical season that offers us many opportunities to calm and center our souls, especially during these turbulent times.

One of the things I like best about Advent is its confounding use of time. Advent intentionally plays with time and, in playing with time,

Advent plays with us. Advent invites us, for example, to imagine that we are like our ancient Israelite forebears, living in the past, in the time *before* the fulfillment of the prophecies of God. Advent invites us to pretend that Christ's birth hasn't happened yet. And so, like the Magi and the little drummer boy, we too are journeying each week in Advent to Bethlehem, getting closer and closer to the birth of Christ, until we finally celebrate Christ's birth at Christmas. "Unto us a child is born!" we sing in Handel's *Messiah*. Advent plays with time so we can better appreciate how the Christian past relates to our Christian now.

Advent also invites us into the future. In fact, the first sense of time that Advent bends is future time. The first Sunday of Advent, for example, always invites us to remember that Christ will return some day in the future in perfect fulfillment of God's dream for creation. We begin with this appreciation of the future at the start of every liturgical year, regardless of whether we are reading St. Matthew, St. Mark, or St. Luke as our Sunday spiritual Gospel guide. Indeed, in the first weekend of Advent in every liturgical year, the Church points us to the future to remind us: Christ will come again. And the theme and invitation is always the same: were Christ to come now, are you ready? Are you happy with how you are living your life now? In what ways are you satisfied? What are you going to do this Advent about your dissatisfactions, so you experience more satisfactions in your life? How are you going to celebrate your satisfactions in a more intentional, mindful way that makes a daily difference in your sense of personal gratitude?

Past, present, and future–Advent is always playing with all three, simultaneously, like a musician playing multiple cords on an organ, so that we can grow and find comfort in even the darkest of the winter days.

One poet who wrestled with darkness, with wintry days, and with the meaning of Christ's birth for the past, present, and future times was the Irish poet William Butler Years (1865-1939). His poem, "The Second Coming," feels eerily prescient and worthy of an Advent reflection:

The Second Coming by William Butler Yeats

Turning and turning in the widening gyre The falcon cannot hear the falconer; Things fall apart; the centre cannot hold; Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world, The blood-dimmed tide is loosed, and everywhere The ceremony of innocence is drowned; The best lack all conviction, while the worst Are full of passionate intensity.

Surely some revelation is at hand; Surely the Second Coming is at hand. The Second Coming! Hardly are those words out When a vast image out of *Spiritus Mundi* Troubles my sight: somewhere in sands of the desert A shape with lion body and the head of a man, A gaze blank and pitiless as the sun, Is moving its slow thighs, while all about it Reel shadows of the indignant desert birds. The darkness drops again; but now I know That twenty centuries of stony sleep Were vexed to nightmare by a rocking cradle, And what rough beast, its hour come round at last, Slouches towards Bethlehem to be born?

Here's another great poem for your Advent consideration from the American poet W. H. Auden (1907-1973). This snippet comes from his long poem, "A Christmas Oratorio," and is also worth snacking on at some point during your 2023 Advent pilgrimage:

He is the Way. Follow Him through the Land of Unlikeness; You will see rare beasts, and have unique adventures. He is the Truth. Seek Him in the Kingdom of Anxiety; You will come to a great city that has expected your return for years. He is the Life. Love Him in the World of the Flesh; And at your marriage all its occasions shall dance for joy.

It's Advent, Beloved. Thanks be to God!

I don't know about you, but I need Advent. Especially this year, given the state of our society and the world. I need Advent's themes, its pageantry, its hopefulness, its symbols, its challenges–I need it all. And so does our world.

I heartily welcome and invite you to embrace Advent 2023 deeply. The Church, using Auden's phrase, does not "lack conviction." Advent, the Church declares, has the power to renew, to reconfigure, and to transform lives. But it can't do it without you. Put yourself in the path of Advent to personally experience the healing and the transformation.

Heading into this Advent season, we have worked hard to provide a cornucopia of liturgical and service opportunities this December to feed and sustain your soul, wherever you may find yourself this year. This includes both embracing the old and creating something new at Grace. See the schedule of December and Advent activities included in this newsletter for specifics. It includes a special liturgy for those grieving (A Quieter Advent service), the very special service of Lessons and Carols, and two Christmas Eve services. As always: invite family, neighbors, and friends. It's free and open to all.

I close with one of my favorite poems, written by one of the great Muslim poets and spiritual masters, Jalāl al-Dīn Muḥammad Rūmī (1207-1273). This poem perfectly embodies the spirit, invitation, and hopefulness of Advent:

Come, come Whoever you are: Wanderer, worshipper, lover of leaving. Come, Even if you have broken your vow One thousand times. Come yet again.

Come.

Come.

It's Advent, Beloved. Thanks be to God!

DEACON'S MESSAGE: A WORD A DAY

As we come into the season of Advent, we are called to make time for quiet reflection. Every year, as I enter this season of preparation, I make more time for prayer, and for witnessing the world around me.

To that end, I participate in an online Advent Calendar. I invite you to join me. For each day of Advent, Forward Movement publishes a word, along with an image. There is also a short reflection on the word that can be accessed via their podcast, or on their website.

Such daily words assist my prayer life and contemplation. Each day I focus on the Advent Word of the day, pray, and either look for an appropriate photo in my camera roll, or take a new one. Participating in this Advent Word experience is like a combined *Lectio* and *Visio Divina*—divine word and divine image.

Then I post to social media—typically to Facebook and Instagram. I also use the hashtags #adventword and the actual word (for example #spirit) to make my posts easy to search. Everyone is encouraged to do the same.

Searching for those hashtags online yields so many great perspectives. This daily practice helps me get ready for the new life that comes with Christmas.






OUR NEXT BOOK IS THE NOVEL THE OVERSTORY BY RICHARD POWERS!
