They are not domesticated. Though not wild, they are respected for exactly who and what they are. This is an ethical farm. Everything and everyone is treated with the respect they deserve. There's a lesson in this.



We have officially been Grace Church for over a year now and we must also not take that for granted. A lot of work went into its birth. The parents of Grace, St. Paul's and Trinity, have been set aside now and we must continue into this new year with the commitment to growing and strengthening what is new and promising. Actually, not so new anymore. We've worked hard at being Grace. We've moved beyond the time of saying we've always done it this way. And now it's time to make new traditions and use our new legs. Just like the young cows walking on unsteady new legs, it's hard not to have things the way they always were, to be a little unsteady, but the year is new, and we must live into that too.

Let's think outside the box. What might we do that's new? What ministries have we never tried that we might? How about a freezer with casseroles at the ready for a sick parishioner's family? We've started a lectionary reading group that meets one Sunday a month—as a matter of fact you can join us on Saturday the 8th in the parish hall after the service. We meet for an hour and look at the readings for the coming four Sundays. No prior knowledge needed! All are welcome. Later in the month we hope to launch our Coffee Hour Forums where we will have a guest to share on a relevant topic. What topics are you interested in? Do you know a guest you would like to invite? Perhaps you would like to present on something. Please speak to me or one of your wardens or vestry members if you have ideas!

One thing I would like to see is more people participating in the services. Readers, acolytes, ushers, stream team, Altar Guild, coffee hour hosts, and choir members. There are a lot of positions involved in a single Sunday service. Please consider how you might participate. We mustn't keep relying on the same handful of members. Though I know everyone loves what they're doing, it's unfair that there are many people who are serving so often. Wherever you might like to participate, you'll learn what there is to love about serving God in these and other ministries.

Let's be like the farm, where everyone and everything is treated with the respect it deserves! I love you all; my new year's prayer for us is that all our dreams come true in 2023.

Mildred Jesse Puchir of Ossining, beloved, wife, mother, grandmother, and great grandmother passed away on Saturday, December 10, 2022. She was 101, just shy of her 102nd birthday on January 31st. Mildred and her husband Mike established Ossining Hardware in 1950.

Mildred was born on January 31, 1921 in Yonkers, NY to Elizabeth and Valentine Weisensee. She went to Commerce High School and worked in NYC for the marine contracting company McCutchen's on Madison Avenue. She was responsible for estimating and procuring the contents of ships built at that time.

On August 31, 1946 Mildred Weisensee married Michael Puchir at St, John's Episcopal Church in Yonkers, NY. She was a member of Saint Paul's on the Hill Episcopal Church in Ossining, NY and participated in many church

activities. She will be remembered for her beauty, kindness, her knitting talent and her love of cooking and baking. Her Blueberry brickle and pies were a fan favorite!

She is survived by her dear friend Joe Holohan, 3 children, Robert (Jeanne), Carol and Diane (Steven), 5 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren.

Members of her family who died earlier include brother Valentine and daughter Elizabeth Julia.




