Hi Everyone,

In May, I attended an Episcopal Church conference required of clergy and also did my niece's wedding during the Memorial Day weekend in Chattanooga. Both were great events to be a part of, but I'm looking forward to staying put here at Grace in June.

As you can see from these *Grace Notes*, great progress continues at Grace to move us to the next level of our integration. I'm proud of that hard work by all at Grace and grateful to all the people and all the ministry groups mentioned herein. Here are some additional updates on that progress:

1. The admin staff (paid and volunteers) – me, Tina, Tam, and Kate, with input from Deacon Dorothée – engaged in lots of discussions for weeks on how we could consolidate our office operations for greater efficiency, effectiveness, and cost-savings. We decided that both campuses must retain their offices to support the many and vibrant ministries that happen at both historic Grace campuses, and that the office on the St. Paul's campus would be publicly identified as our main Grace office for efficient public access to us. We decided not to renew two separate copier leases at both campuses, but to renew one lease for the St. Paul's office and to purchase a new color laser printer for the Trinity office, a savings of approximately \$20,000 over 5 years. Both offices will retain their phones and their same phone numbers, and we also decided our existing P.O. Box 108 would remain the mailing address for Grace Church Ossining. Tina also has a new email: tina@graceossining.org. Email her to say Hi!
2. Furthermore, the vestry affirmed a modification of the Grace logo so that we can begin marketing Grace more often and more effectively for increased growth. The existing logo now has a tagline underneath it: "One new Episcopal Church from two historic parishes: St. Paul's on the Hill and Trinity Downtown". Thanks to all involved in these deliberations. 3. The vestry also decided to contract with James Elrod, a Connecticut Episcopalian and author of *Creating Financially Sustainable Congregations*, to analyze Grace's financial situation and to help the vestry create progress indicators at our August vestry retreat. We seek to identify concrete measurements to track many things, including our progress in increasing our revenues and decreasing our expenses for the 2024 budget year. I'm grateful for the people who anonymously contributed the funds to hire Jim. Consider buying and reading his book so you can follow and join in these important developments. 4. Deacon Dorothée, as you know, is retiring in October, and we will throw her a large party in celebration not only of her faithful and effective ministry at Grace but also for her effective ministry to the Church at large for decades. I'm working with the diocese to see if we can partner with another deacon, who preferably will overlap with Deacon Dorothée before her October departure. I'll keep you updated on these conversations with the diocese and potential deacons as they unfold.
5. We have hired a new music director: Suji Jung! See Mark Monroe's report (page 9) for more details. Many thanks to Mark, our Music Director Search Chair, for his outstanding leadership. Many thanks as well to the hard-working members of that group: Carolyn, Kellie, and Dennis. Great job!
6. My Coffee Chats continue and shall wrap up this month. Many of the Sunday church attendees have participated already. If you have not, email Tina (tina@graceossining.org) so you can participate before the end of June. I'll summarize the conversations for everyone for the July *Grace Notes*.
7. Some of the ideas from the Coffee Chats are already being implemented. For example, one exciting idea includes the creation of an additional lay-led worship service at Grace. See the article about it on page 13 and email Tina for more information about how you can join in. All are welcome!
8. Another idea from the Coffee Chats is to create one-time events for Grace members to socialize together, to have more fun together outside church, to learn more about each other, to support the local community, to bring friends to our events, etc. While this one is admittedly a last-minute idea as a step in this direction, Lori and I shall be going to the Jacob Burns Film Center this Monday, June 5th, at 7:00 PM to watch the film "Vermeer: The Greatest Exhibit". 9. What ideas for social activities would you like to promote? (Also, do you have a clever name that we can call these events?). Email Tina with your ideas so we can begin promoting them to our terrific community. The more, the merrier!
10. I was honored to represent Grace at the Town of Ossining Pride Flag Raising this past Thursday. Sadly, I was one of only two local clergy present. A number of the participants expressed appreciation that I was there. I am grateful to be living in a town and serving an Episcopal church that isn't afraid to stand up for those in need, professing the Good News that ALL are the Beloved of God. No exceptions or exclusions!



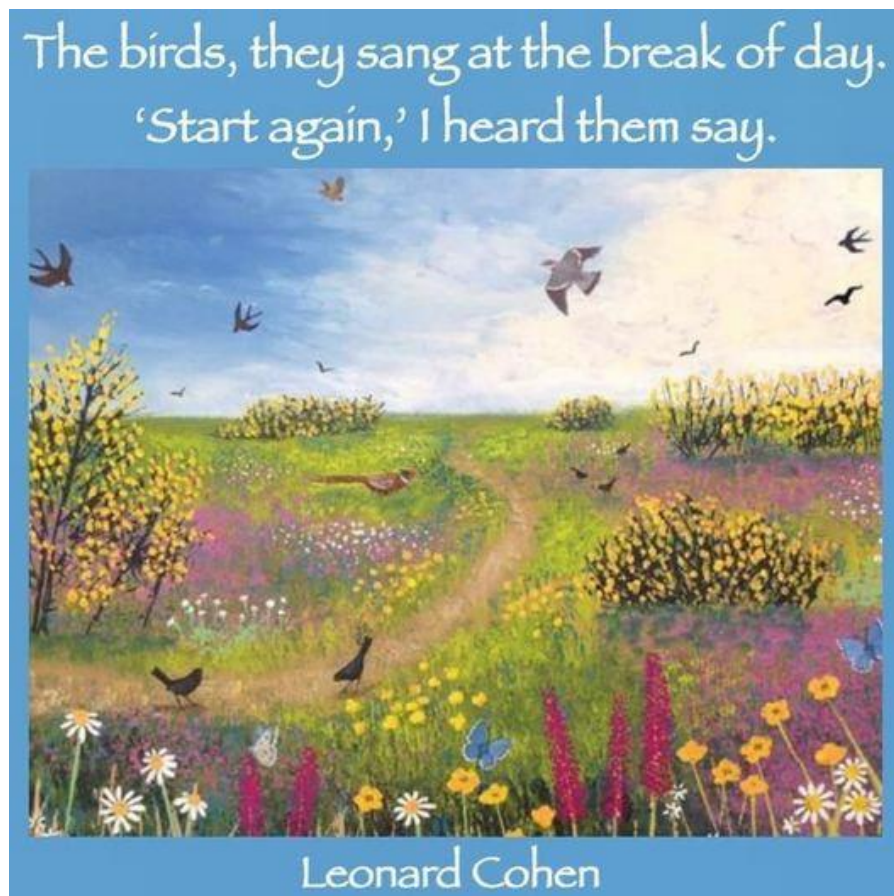

ASA G. BARNES, SR.



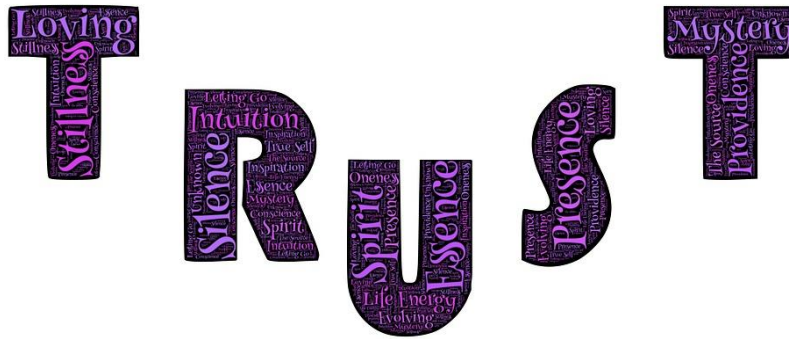
Asa George Barnes, Sr., born on June 24, 1924, son of Margaret Judd and Asa F. Barnes and a lifelong resident of Ossining, NY, died of natural causes May 29, 2023. He was drafted from high school before graduation by the US Army to serve in World War II throughout Europe. He was 98 years old and remained active and in good health until recently, always enjoying time with family, meetings, picnics, and events with his fellow carpenters from Union 149, and Sunday services, coffee hour, and activities with his fellow worshipers at Grace Episcopal Church Ossining (newly comprised of St. Paul's on-the-Hill Campus and Trinity Campus).

He is survived by his wife Marilyn Barnes and three children from his marriage to Iva Barnes who passed in 1999: Maribeth Barnes Osgood and her husband, the Rev. Canon John Osgood; Margery Barnes; and Asa G. Barnes Jr. and his wife Danielle and Marilyn's three children: Robert Irving and

his wife Amy, Thomas Irving and his partner Jonie, and Patty Hall and her husband John. He is also survived by six grandchildren, ten great grandchildren, and two grandchildren of Marilyn's. Asa was predeceased by two sons, Gary Barnes and Jeffrey Barnes, and his brother, Richard Barnes.

Asa's strong sense of service to others has always been tightly connected to the St. Paul's Campus of Grace Church Ossining. He gave of himself there so others might receive.

OUR NEW MUSIC DIRECTOR WILL START IN AUGUST

Grace has hired a new Music Director, Suji Jung, who will join us at the beginning of August. Our search process over the last few months produced seven applicants, four initial Zoom interviews, and two strong finalists who visited both campuses, played our instruments, and spent 30 minutes teaching the choir a new piece of music. We put a strong emphasis on people skills and relationship skills in addition to musical skills.

Suji not only played beautifully but led the choir clearly and sensitively in her audition. A little background: she grew up in South Korea, earning bachelor's and master's degrees in piano performance before coming to New York for further studies at the Manhattan School of Music and Teachers College at Columbia University. She has served as a church music director since 1998, in addition to her primary work as a piano teacher. In 2018, she founded a nonprofit organization, ProSono, which gives monthly concerts in nursing homes and hospitals. We feel very fortunate to be welcoming her to Grace Episcopal!

Please join me in some very important thank-yous: most of all to Carolyn Black Hightower, who thought she had retired, but has now led us for over a year as we worked to find first a priest and then a new music director. We love you, Carolyn! I also want to thank our music director search committee: Carolyn, Kellie Ishmael, Dennis Parker, and Fr. Hal. At the beginning we didn't know how to go about finding a new music director, but we worked together to figure it out and everyone made important contributions along the way. Thank you!

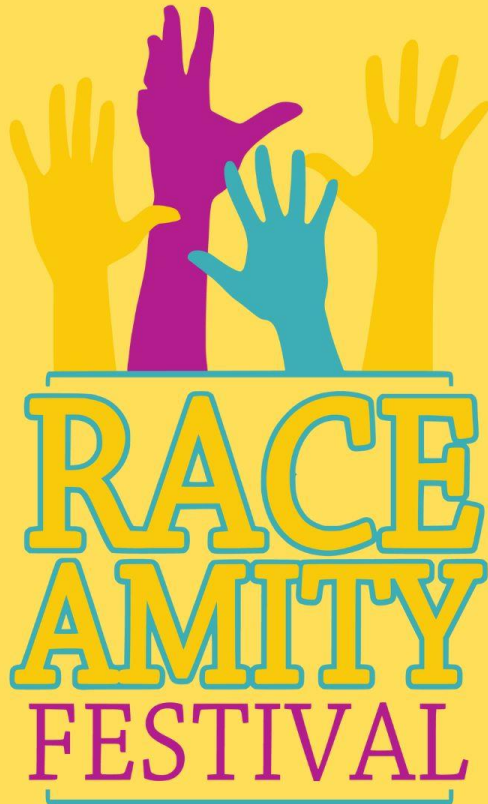
