As we all begin to ease into summer, I want to thank everyone for welcoming me and Lori so generously since our arrival in February. We feel blessed to be here. Grace is a wonderful parish, filled with diverse people and a long history of advancing the public good in Ossining. I am confident, after being here for only five months, that the next phase of Grace's development will build on and add to this important legacy. Lori and I are so excited to be a part of this

important – and fun! – work with you. Thank you!

In preparation for a busy next program year, my best advice to you is this: Rest. Rejuvenate. Enjoy the summer with those you love. Give thanks to God for the good gifts in your life and get ready for the next program year. We shall start preparing for it in August and launch it after Labor Day.

Before then, though, we shall continue with weekly July worship at Grace on the 1st and 3rd Sundays at Grace's historic Trinity campus and on the 2nd and 4th Sunday at our historic St. Paul's campus. Come! The 5th Sunday of July we shall have another special "themed Sunday," this time at Trinity, promoting "Art and Action". With help from the Bethany Art Community staff, artists and folks involved in advancing important social causes in Ossining are being invited to set up tables in Potter Hall to promote their art and causes on July 30th. This is open to the wider Ossining community from noon to 3:00 PM, during our "coffee hour." Join us at worship, stay for coffee hour, and be a part of this art and action event. In fact: Invite friends! The artists and action groups have been invited to join us for worship, and some have already said they will join in.

Like our April "Spring Blessing Service," this "Art and Action" July 5th Sunday service is an experiment. While we haven't had the time or bandwidth to plan this out as fully as we would like in my first five months, I am very hopeful this "proof of concept" experiment will be a success. Art and action groups are excited to showcase their activities in our Trinity location with its walkable access to downtown. I strongly suspect, that with nine months' planning, we can turn this 5th Sunday Trinity "Art and Action" Sunday into an annual July Ossining event that attracts the attention and participation of the wider Ossining community.

To do so is to follow the Gospel in our time and place. As Jesus said, we must discern "new wineskins (ministries) for the new wine (the needs of people in our time)" (Mark 2:22). We have started that discernment at Grace and we shall continue it next year. I look forward to coming back after my vacation time and rolling up my sleeves to continue engaging with you in this vital Gospel work.

The canons give the Wardens charge over all situations, personnel, and ministries in my absence, and Deacon Dorothée will be in charge of all pastoral care during this time. Local priests have also agreed to cover for us for pastoral care if needed, as determined by Deacon Dorothée and the Wardens. The office will function as usual, and our community life will go on, if a bit slower. Enjoy it. We have a great fall coming.


I close with one of my favorite prayers in our Book of Common Prayer, taken from the Letter to the Ephesians:

TRUST by Hernan Diaz, a 2022 Booker Prize winner and NYTimes bestselling novel. This creative work looks at the history of a powerful and wealthy family in the 1920s via four different written accounts in a novel, autobiography, memoir, and diary. Which version is their true origin story? Who is the reliable narrator? I am looking forward to taking a deep dive into this beautifully written work. For more information, click here.

THE OVERSTORY by Richard Powers, is his twelfth work, a 2019 Pulitzer Prize winner which is included on OPRAH's list and made Amazon's Book of the Year category. This Ecofiction novel follows the intersection of the trees, the history they witness and the stories of nine disparate characters which eventually raises some very important questions and suggests very sobering outcomes for all. THE SWEETNESS OF WATER by Nathan Harris, is an unforgettable debut novel about trauma and survival during the early Reconstruction period in the American South. NPR's review had this packed sentiment about the timelessness of this story:

The Sweetness of Water is having a moment that goes beyond topicality. There are several reasons for that: First, its question feels urgent and familiar, because politics now feels like war. Between the January insurrection, the threat of Texas secession, and the daily rhetoric of combat and revolution, the battles are ongoing, not just along party but also regional lines. ... In struggles over flags, monuments, textbooks, and university tenure, we're still fighting over how to frame this event in public memory, so those old wounds feel particularly fresh. Nathan Harris makes those extraordinary, still contested times comprehensible through an immersive, incredibly humane storytelling about the lives of ordinary people.




Jonathan Daniels Civil Rights Youth Pilgrimage
